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APPENDIX C

Strengths and Losses at the Battle of Antietam and the Battle of Shepherdstown

In his final report on the Maryland Campaign, George McClellan gave the strength of the Army of the Potomac at Antietam as 87,164. This figure is its aggregate strength—in other words, every man in uniform in the army. Approximately 17% of this number were detailed to non-combat duties, such as teamsters, cooks, hospital stewards, stretcher bearers, and the like. As the accompanying table shows, its fighting strength was approximately 72,199 men. The losses of the Union army at Antietam and Shepherdstown, as published in volume 19 of *War of the Rebellion: A Compilation of the Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies*, are generally quite accurate. There was one anomaly: the 16th Connecticut, whose officially reported losses at Antietam were 42 killed, 143 wounded, and 0 missing or captured. Subsequent research revealed that their actual number of casualties was 43 killed, 164 wounded, 20 captured, and 19 missing (who were deserters). There may be other discrepancies that continuing research will reveal, but in general, the Union army maintained reliable records of their battle losses.

The same cannot be said for the Army of Northern Virginia, either for their losses or their strengths. Record keeping was quite poor, partly due to high attrition among company and field officers. Arriving at accurate numbers for Confederate troops or casualties for the Battle of Sharpsburg, as they called this conflict, is a maddening exercise. The following table should be considered simply as a starting point. We will never know with any precision precisely how many men Robert E. Lee had that day. Some units had stragglers trickling in throughout the day, so their strength fluctuated. This was particularly true for A. P. Hill's division. Nevertheless, the numbers for the Confederate army, as shown in the table, are close to Lee's engaged strength.

The official casualty figures the Confederates released, which are published in the *War of the Rebellion* records, volume 19, part 1, pages 810–813, are so inaccurate that they are of limited value. For example, the 6th Georgia was reported to have had 10 killed and 13 wounded, when their actual loss was 81 killed, 115 wounded, and 30 missing or captured. Figures for the 5th Florida, which sustained 159 casualties, were not reported at all. No missing or captured men were included for any unit in the entire army, even though there were hundreds. The records also included losses at the Battles of South Mountain and Shepherdstown in this tabulation. Ezra Car-

man, the colonel in the 13th New Jersey and, later, the historian for the Antietam National Battlefield, did yeoman work in assembling strength and loss figures for the Army of Northern Virginia, and my efforts build off his. In most instances I have accepted Carman's numbers for total losses for brigades, divisions, and wings, unless I felt that the contrary evidence I had discovered was solid. This can lead to some odd situations, such as my acceptance of Carman's figures for D. H. Hill's wounded and missing men, but not for those killed. This was because the numbers I found for those in the division who were killed, while still slightly low in relation to its actual loss, are higher than what Carman listed, and I have confidence in these amounts. I had less assurance in my figures for the wounded and missing in the division, however, since we have no casualty records for some regiments. Here I used Carman's numbers, since his information always came from veterans. It should also be noted that the "Total" columns for brigades, divisions, and wings will sometimes not agree with the figures that exist for individual regiments. I used the best sources available, but their cumulative totals might differ from Carman's amounts. An example is Drayton's brigade. Carman's figure—142—is 4 higher than the total of the regimental losses in the table. Unfortunately, we do not always know where Carman's information came from, but a rule of thumb for the Army of Northern Virginia is that the highest casualty totals from a reliable source are usually correct, since that army consistently undercounted its losses. The figures in the accompanying table should be considered the minimum number of casualties for the Confederates. They may have been as high as 11,000.

A good online source to consult for the strengths and losses in both armies, as well as for personnel known to have been present in the battle, is Brian Downey's Antietam on the Web, at https://antietam.aotw.org, which is continually updated.
